Mayor's Desk

We have just finished our Long Term Plan deliberations. We are thrilled with the high level of engagement and the number of submissions coming forward from right throughout the district has been record-breaking.

Where we are at? We have decided on a rate increase of just over

7% to be formally adopted by Council as part of the LTP process following audit approval. Some of the standouts for the communities are that we have put \$25,000 into the Wilson Park Development Group and \$50,000 into the Taihape Playground. We have also committed to a process around the strengthening and refurbishment of the existing Grandstand at Taihape Memorial Park. These issues were all strongly supported by community submissions.

The Long Term Plan was of course prepared on the basis that we would retain all of the delivery of the "Three Waters" provision of wastewater, stormwater and potable water for our community. We are still engaged heavily, like every other district in New Zealand, in discussions as to whether that will be the case or if it will be the function of another company as an aggregated supply. We understand that from late this month there will be a very wide public consultation around this.

Council has expressed concern over funding levels for roading. We have faced a cut (after we did our budgets) from Waka Kotahi of around \$7million spread over the first three years of our Long Term Plan. Council has voted strongly that we take that concern back to Government around the under-investment on the maintenance of our roads. Unfortunately this isn't unique to our Council – it factors with every rural council in New Zealand.
