FROM THE Mayor'S DESK

At the last Council meeting one of the principle discussions was around what we refer to as Tranche 1 funding for the Government's Better Off funding package. Our share of this is \$3.3m and we will need to apply for it.

Council's thinking was certainly to apply for maximum amount we are eligible for and part of the thinking behind that was the

second tranche of funding may not be available if there's a change of Government. Within that available funding the things we are considering are first of all, housing and district plan work, climate change work, the Hautapu River project run by Friends of Taihape, money for rejuvenation of town centres, some flood design work for Marton and the balance of the money being used to bring forward the Taihape Civic Centre rebuild project with investigation and design.

Council is nearing the end of its term of office. Councillor Coral Raukawa and Councillor Tracey Piki Te Ora Hiroa have been appointed unopposed in the new Māori Ward seats as sole nominations. In the Southern Ward, Councillor Brian Carter retains his seat and we welcome new Councillor Jarrod Calkin, both were appointed unopposed. I would like to take this opportunity to mention that Councillor Carter has just been recognised as having served 50 years as a volunteer fire officer with the Bulls Fire Brigade – truly an outstanding feat.

On 20 August the artworks outside the Te Matapihi building were unveiled by the artists Pip Devonshire and Reweti Arapere from Ngāti Parewahawaha and Ngāti Raukawa. The artworks are superb and tell the story of the surrounding district, highlighting the awa – Rangitīkei river and the associated iwi and being contemporary in nature, sit incredibly well with the design and function of Te Matapihi.

I recently attended an earthquake strengthening seminar at Te Matapihi, presented by Dr Dmytro Dizhur and Roger Wilkinson showing that the world of earthquake strengthening has moved on with much more modern techniques making it more affordable to preserve the earthquake prone buildings we have in our district. Thanks to our Economic Development Advisor Jaime Reibel for co-ordinating this informative seminar.

I also attended a planting day in Marton to finish off the winter planting program around the Tütaenui Reservoir (B&C dams). The reservoir walk is incredibly popular and as a result several people have asked me about the earthworks at the toe of the bottom dam. This is the site of the second well being drilled to provide a stable water source for Marton's drinking water, removing the need to use dam water. This is part of an \$11m planned upgrade improvement to Marton Water.

I would like to congratulate local Edale resident Dickie Hammond on "100 not out" – Dickie celebrated her 100th birthday on 29 August with well wishers queuing up at her door. Dickie is quite the local celebrity and myself and Council congratulate her on this milestone.

We are now in the election period and the critical message here is that people must vote. It is quite concerning that turnout in recent elections has been very low across the district. Voting papers will start being delivered on 16 September - please have your say.

New defibrillators installed across Rangitīkei

We've installed four new automated external defibrillators (AEDs) across our District.

An AED can increase someone's chance of survival by up to 80% if applied immediately. We want to make accessing AED's easier for our communities.

The new locations include:

- Te Matapihi Bulls Community Centre (24 hour access)
- Taihape Library (24 hour access)
- Council Depot, King Street, Marton (24 hour access)
- Council Offices, High Street, Marton

Rangitīkei District Council Health Safety and Wellbeing Advisor Marcelle said, "AED's can be the difference between life and death so it was really important for us to make these more accessible for our communities."

AED's are used to revive someone when they go into sudden cardiac arrest. A cardiac arrest occurs when the heart stops pumping blood around the body. You should use the AED if you can't feel a pulse and the person isn't breathing. For more information on the signs of cardiac arrest visit heartfoundation.org.nz

Each of our AED sites are fitted with a set of instructions. Once you begin using the AED a loud instructional voice recording will prompt you through the steps. Although they might look a bit intimidating, it's as easy as tying your shoes.
