FROM THE Mayor's Desk



Over the last couple of days the new Mayors of Auckland and Christchurch have put a position paper to the Government supporting the need for a pause in the Three Waters Reform and the need for an alternate regional model.

These concepts are not new, and there have been a number of Councils, including our own, saying that the Government needs to pause and to look at how we regionally connect - and we are fully in support of this. The telling factor here will be the scale – with Christchurch and Auckland being by far the biggest cities within the country their voices carry a lot of weight back to Government. One of the concerns we hold about the proposed Three Waters reform is the lack of detail and consultation; and at this stage the regional model proposed is a two-pager which requires time to develop.

With regards to a regional model within the Horizons region, we are very well connected with local authority shared services and relationships between Councils in the Three Waters space. However, our region is huge and what may be suitable for some communities will need to be a different model here. We will be asking Councillors to consider how we respond in the first few meetings of the new triennium.

For the Council meeting this week, we have asked Federated Farmers to come to the table regarding the effects of the emission legislation. We are hoping that Federated Farmers may give Council some options to consider around how we engage with the Government, and how we frame our submission back which is due very shortly. Rangitikei has also been highlighted with regard to the carbon credit position with the potential for one of our large rural stations Omatane being out for tender.

Thank you to those who came to the first Council meeting on 25 October where I was inducted as Mayor and our Councillors were sworn in. The new Council timetable is filling up rapidly. We will have a series of training sessions both onside and within Council for new governors with familiarisation visits where Councillors can see what we are responsible for, where our assets are and what the issues are that we will need Council decisions on. Introducing our new Deputy Mayor We welcomed our new Council in Bulls last week as they joined together for the first time for the Inaugural Council Meeting.

At the meeting, Mayor Andy Watson named Councillor Dave Wilson as Deputy Mayor. The new Deputy Mayor has been on Council for six years, where he has held the role of Chair of Assets and Infrastructure Committee Chair, and is now entering his third triennium.

Mayor Andy says that having interviewed all of the Councillors, he knows that Dave has total support for the role and is thrilled to have accepted him into the position.

Forestry Differential Public Meeting

We're seeking insight and feedback from the forestry industry and other stakeholders regarding the introduction of a proposed differential rate for forestry.

The proposed forestry differential seeks to introduce a differential rate to forestry properties to recover some of the costs of repairing damage to roads caused by forestry vehicles; an approach that has been taken by a number of other local authorities in New Zealand. Council's preferred choice outlined in the 2022/2023 Annual Plan was to introduce a 1.5 rate differential on the Roading Targeted Rate for properties that are classified as Forestry.

Based on the feedback we received through the consultation, Council decided to defer implementing a differential rate until we had the opportunity to work further with the Forestry Industry, iwi and key stakeholders, to hear what other options may be available.
