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Hall was full to bursting and this was a very significant occasion for both Rātana and our iwi and I was very pleased to be able to represent Council. I attend numerous functions at Rātana and sometimes attend their Church Services in the Temple and I feel as though I am very much part of the community so it was nice to be able to sit alongside them and support them on Sunday.

At the moment all of New Zealand and Local Government are effectively in a holding pattern while we wait for the outcome of the general election. Whichever party is elected there is likely to be significant change in things such as the Resource Management Act and the provision of services within the Three Waters – wastewater, drinking water and stormwater. We are currently in the middle of a planning cycle called the Long Term Plan and the government position will be crucial to understanding what our responsibilities will be in these areas. If there is to be a change of government, which some of the media seem to predict, there will be an enormous number of changes that Council will have to work with. Often with elections, Local Government and Central Government people talk about "what can a new party or council do in the first 100 days?". This tends to be a catchphrase but in this case the first 100 days will be absolutely crucial in terms of our planning cycles. Both Council and staff literally wait with bated breath as to what their roles will be.

On top of that Council is also going through a process around who would deliver our roading maintenance contracts over the next nine years. Our contract currently sits with Higgins and while there are a limited number of contractors who would have the capacity to be able to deliver, I would love to see contracts awarded where local contractors can be part of those discussions. Being honest, the state of our roads are a huge concern to both myself and Council. The maintenance of them is dropping away and the amount of money that the government has to spend in this space is driving that change.
