# FROM THE Mayor'S DESK

Kia ora koutou, the Daybreaker Rally kicked off in Feilding on 22 September. Manawatū Mayor Helen and myself were given the incredibly important tasks of flagging the cars on their way. I was stunned at the number of spectators who came to watch the ceremonial start. People queued for the best part of one and a half hours to get the signatures of drivers like Hayden Paddon and Shane van Gisbergen.

The rally travelled over both Manawatū and Rangitīkei roads and we are often told they are the best and most challenging rallying roads in New Zealand. Spring Fling is organised annually by the Taihape Community Development Trust and is a tremendous showcase of talent and entertainment and I thank Pania and her team for making it possible. For me it was the chance to grab a hot pie, something to drink and to wander the streets talking to people and spending time looking at the rally cars.

I am writing this on the 2nd of October, the day that voting opens for the general elections.
