ADOPTION - 20 June 2024 Our Mayor and Councillors will vote to adopt the Long Term Plan.

ACTION - 1 July 2024 Our team will get on to putting the Long Term Plan into action.

Climate Change strategy completed

Climate change is one of the most tangible threats to our way of life that society will face in the coming decades. In order to respond to this, there is a role for Rangitikei District Council (RDC) to play our part and support our district decarbonise, adapt, mitigate and prepare for the coming challenges.



RDC used \$75,000 of Better Off Funding to complete our Climate Change strategy and action plan. Central government has set aside

\$2 billion (nationwide) for councils to use to improve amenity and outcomes for residents.

We have already started with the Tutaenui Reserve Restoration Project. This is a fantastic example of 'For Community by Community' with collaboration from Council. The transformation of the Tutaenui Reserve Restoration project, from a raw water source earned a nomination at the 2022 LGNZ Excellence awards.

Climate change is a responsibility that belongs to all of us, acting today makes it better for everyone tomorrow.
