Rangitikei District Council adopts 2024 - 2034 Long-term Plan

At its Council meeting held on Thursday, 27 June, Rangitikei District Council adopted its Where's it @ Rangitikei Long-term Plan for 2024 - 2035, which secures the capital works programme for the next ten years. Assuming 1% growth in rateable properties for the next three years, the average rates increase will be 10.5% for the 2024/25 year, followed by 8.9% for Year 2, and 9.75% for Year 3 of the LTP.

During the consultation period, Rangitikei residents were asked to consider options on three key issues, the potential opening of Marton Pool all year round, how recycling services would be introduced starting in 2027, and upgrades to the Marton's CBD. When it came to the deliberations, Council decided to keep the Marton Pool to its seasonal opening, stagger the introduction of recycling services, and committed to upgrading Marton's CBD with an approved budget of \$2.1 million.

Audit New Zealand have given Rangitikei District Council's Long-term Plan an unmodified opinion.

Mayor Andy Watson thanked the 454 residents who submitted on the Long-term Plan, and also passed on thanks to staff for their work in putting the plan together.

The Long-term Plan came into effect on Monday, 1 July.



Rangitikei District Council bring roading and water services in house

As of 1 July 2024, Rangitikei District Council will bring roading and three waters back in house, and the Shared Services Agreement with Manawatū District Council will end for these services.

Both Rangitikei District Council and Manawatū District Council undertook a review of the agreement that has been in place since 2008. It has been agreed that Rangitikei is now in a position where it could deliver these services to its residents, although some aspects may be contracted out where needed.

Rangitikei District Council and Manawatū District Council have worked to ensure that staff transferring to RDC have a smooth transition, including all the equipment and documentation that they need for their new roles.

All but three staff who were employed by MDC have been offered transfers to RDC, and we're pleased that all of these have accepted positions.

Project work that has been planned whilst roading and three waters services were being managed by MDC will carry on unaffected by the changes.

Council has extended the road maintenance contract with Higgins as our roading contractor for the next 12 months to allow time to complete the procurement process for a new contract starting on 1 July 2025. This contract extension will ensure that there is continuity for the roading projects that are currently underway.

Bringing these services in house is not expected to cost ratepayers any more money than has been budgeted as part of the Long-term Plan and may result in some savings.

Rangitikei District Council will continue to provide Animal Control Services for both districts.



Newest New Zealanders welcomed

Otara Bridge Repairs

Work to strengthen the Otara Bridge continues with the replacement of 22 vertical hangers. The hangers are currently being manufactured and will be installed between 15 July and 16 August, weather permitting.

During this period the bridge will be closed to all traffic from 9:00am to 3:00pm, Monday through to Friday.

Outside these times the bridge is restricted to vehicles with a weight limit of 6 tonnes, at a speed of 10 km per hour, with one vehicle crossing at a time travelling central to the bridge.
