

SUBMISSION TO ANNUAL PLAN 2016-17

Thank you for the opportunity to submit to your Council's Annual Plan 2016-2017.

As you will be aware regional prosperity has been high on the agenda for councils around the region. Collaboration and agreement on this priority among councils resulted in the government commissioning the Manawatu-Whanganui Regional Growth Study launched in July 2015. The study identified eight key opportunities for the region to pursue to help lift regional prosperity. These may be in addition to priorities that individual councils and economic development agencies are already working on.

The region committed to producing a regional action plan as a follow-up to the growth study. The action plan is being produced under the banner of Accelerate>25. Production of the Plan is being funded by Horizons Regional Council, the Ministry of Business, Innovation and Employment, and the Ministry for Primary Industries. It is expected to be launched by Ministers in July / August 2016. The action plan identifies what the region, as a whole, needs to do to take advantage of the opportunities identified in the growth study. The action plan process has been lead by a governance group known as the Lead Team, comprising elected members, business people and iwi from across the region.

I would like to thank your council for its ongoing support for regional prosperity and in particular the Accelerate25 programme and our work with government. On behalf of the Lead Team I seek your ongoing support for the programme in 2016/2017. The Lead Team is not requesting financial support from your Council, rather the Lead Team is seeking your continued active engagement and spirit of regional collaboration. There will be actions arising from the action plan relevant to local government that the Lead Team will be keen to discuss with you.

The Lead Team does not wish to be heard as part of your Annual Plan deliberations. However, the Lead Team would welcome the opportunity to discuss the draft Regional Action Plan and ideas for ongoing regional collaboration with your Council. I suggest that this happen at a suitable workshop time for your Council during May / early June and before Ministers launch the Accelerate25 Action Plan for the region. 

COMMITTED TO GROWING OUR REGION



Members of the <u>Accelerate25 Lead Team</u> met in Feilding on 24 March where they discussed Action Plan progress and the need to look beyond the Plan's launch to ensure long-term success. The Team was pleased with the programme's progress and the quality of discussion at workshops being held across the region to determine key actions.

While Programme Directors are currently running ahead of schedule in terms of drafting content for the final Action Plan, there's no time to rest on our laurels. We now need to consider what resources, tools, partnerships and structures will be required for successful implementation. A number of the region's councils are currently consulting on their Annual Plans for 2016/17. Horizons Regional and Ruapehu District councils in particular have posed questions around their ongoing role in economic development. I encourage you to give some thought to what this should look like and have your say via the submission process.


Achieving the actions set out in our Regional Action Plan will require investment and initiative across the spectrum from independent investors, businesses, local government and central government. This is a major point of consideration for the Accelerate25 Lead Team ahead of the final Plan's launch. They are very conscious of the need to ensure structures and partnerships are in place to keep up the momentum and this will remain a focus over the coming months. Te Puni Kokiri is also funding work around characterising the Maori economy in the Manawatu–Whanganui region. This is being led by Dr Jason Mika and will continue through to October. The Lead Team noted that it was important to acknowledge this in the creation of the Action Plan and allow room for the findings of this work in its implementation.

Another point discussed at workshops has been around the need to better capture and share our regional story. One Region, One Team has become a catch-cry for the Accelerate25 Programme. So, over the next few weeks we will be working on promotional material to help us better convey the opportunities that exist for people seeking a great place to live, work, play and invest. Thank you to MPI and TPK who have provided funding for this project. We look forward to sharing this with you. Watch this space.

ONE REGION ONE TEAM

March was a busy month for the region with a number of new businesses opening their doors and huge numbers flocking in for the inaugural Agri Investment Week and Central Districts Field Days. Below are a few highlights from the past month as we look towards completion of the Regional Action Plan in early May.



Prime Minister John Key attended the opening of **Speldhurst Country Estate** Lifestyle Village on the site of the old Kimberley Centre in late March. The lifestyle village is currently valued at about \$160 million and is expected to house more than 600 people. Developer Wayne Bishop studied lifestyle villages, both in New Zealand and overseas, for many years prior to developing Speldhurst and saw the Kimberley Centre site as providing an opportunity for an "awesome living space for older people". During his time in the district, the Prime Minister also cut the ribbon to officially open chicken farm, Le Poulet Fabuleux, in Himatangi. This local, family-operated farm has created jobs within the community as well as overseas through export.





Comment

If funding is not immediately available for this particular programme, I still believe council should be involved in youth development and continue to do what it can to support Rangitikei youth.

Recommendation

The decision regarding Taihape Memorial Park should be taken in conjunction with a whole plan for Taihape, all community facilities, not just sports, such as the Town Hall "Civic Centre". This should run in conjunction with a whole district plan.

I would also hope that when this review takes place, council will continue to express its view stated in this document:

"Council's heritage protection strategy and the proposed changes to heritage buildings in the District Plan are both likely to help find a historically sympathetic and functional Civic Centre."

Comment

I am disappointed that the submission form does not offer a space for 'an alternative option'. \$500,000 is a lot of ratepayers' money to say yes to, when there is very little other money going into Taihape. The summary report itself identified some needs which are very material to Taihape as a whole relating to Linkages between Memorial Park and the Main Street/CBD: currently poor visual connection to the pool, need for street furniture and consistent design standards, need for street planting, current lack of effective signage, improved walkway network of short well planned and developed all weather tracks to enhance the Taihape experience.

Submission on Rangitikei District Council Annual Plan 2016/17: from Angela Oliver

In addition, if I were in favour of the proposal, I would want a different split of funding/ratepayer contribution. Instead of 100:500, it should perhaps be 500:100.

The whole consultation process was badly advertised and there are few Taihape residents, apart from the Park Users, who are aware of this proposal. There has been no opportunity for the public as a whole to discuss this.

Even with regard to irrigation, I am not convinced that the proposal has been properly discussed. Is the council sure that the inground system fits with the equestrian requirements?

Currently the council appears to be tackling the issues on an ad hoc basic, rather than a whole plan.

Not so long ago, \$100,000 for heating the Town Hall was deferred, and then later on omitted in future budgets. So now we have a Civic Centre the town is still trying to utilise, but without any heating. And there are currently no plans for an alternative Taihape civic centre, I would suggest that if heating were now installed, it would run its 'asset life' before any decision is made.

"Placemaking" initiatives are also being brought in on an ad hoc basis, without an overall plan and consistency in design. More money needs to be put into this aspect as well and would encompass the needs expressed in the summary report. It seems ironic to me that the council is prepared to spend \$500,000 for one project which only targets a minority of ratepayers, when the expenditure on, for instance, "placemaking", which is meant to revitalise the whole town, is insignificant.



Those that cannot be reached by email should receive a letter. Posters should be erected in town, leaflets left at businesses, and more meetings held. Letters can be sent to local clubs, asking them to advise their members of the issues and meeting dates. Should Council construct a new amenity block in Taihape Memorial Park?

Clubs Taihape Inc. supports Council's Option 1 - proposal of constructing a new amenity block in Memorial Park, conditional on \$100,000 being funded from external agencies.

Clubs Taihape's preferred site is option 2 in Peter Shore's discussion document on Taihape Memorial Park Future Development. Therefore, Clubs Taihape would like to see the new amenity block catering to netball/tennis players/spectators by also having wide steps that could be used as seating that are undercover. This cover could be decking that would enhance viewing over all three fields.

The decking would be part of a 2nd storey that includes a lounge/dining area able to house a grand piano and, at least one snooker table and two/three pool tables, a kitchen, bar and toilets (with a lift). Clubs Taihape Inc. are keen to enhance Council's proposed amenity block by organising a project to build the 2nd storey.

Such a site would equally benefit rugby, equestrian, cricket, tennis, netball, Gumboot Day, A&P Show, Whanau Sports, hockey and soccer events, and would not impose on Kokako Street residents.

Clubs Taihape Inc. also supports installing an irrigation system (not an in-ground system – prefer the pod system), and the purchase of portable grandstands.

There are approximately 60 rugby players for whom Council is considering a spend of \$600,000 because of the grandstand obsolescence. The site preferred by Clubs Taihape is at the juncture of the three playing fields with improved parking and direct street access from Weka Street. The need for six changing rooms by Rugby occurs maybe twice a year.

Option 2 siting suits 300 court players as well as four equestrian clubs and A&P. The preferred site takes advantage of Netball/Tennis's willingness to trade court space for pavilion facilities which needs ground floor space facing onto the courts. In addition, the

hose-down changing rooms needs to be suited as much to netball players as it does to rugby players.

Clubs Taihape would like the Council to be less biased towards one code and provide an amenity more suited towards the majority of Park users. The original concept was to build a facility to accommodate a number of clubs and be able to host different groups at the same time, including large events for the town. Three pool tables would be a good base to build a snooker tournament/

event and Peter Shore reports on the suitability of Taihape's position to hold events with a population of 1 million within a three-hour drive.



I read of the proposal to purchase the derelict property on the High St / Broadway corner of Marton to build a new Town Hall facility. This is a good idea and would smarten up the town. Irrespective of it's architectural merits, the building is a mess and the current owner will be pleased to sell on a total lemon at any price. My concern is with the building's current Historic Places Trust Listing, and I am concerned about years of endless legal expense in the Courts with the NZHPT who, I understand, have effectively blocked two past moves to redevelop the site.

I presume that the Council has already been in touch with NZHPT and if not, why not? May I strongly submit a proposal that the purchase proceed, but with the sale contract subject to the PRIOR, WRITTEN consent from the Historic Places Trust that no objection will be raised with the planned demolition. This must be part of any agreement. Your lawyer can easily write it on the contract. The emphasis is with the words prior, and written consent, BEFORE any agreement takes place . Years of High Court wrangles will cost us many times more than the bargain purchase price, and if no prior agreement over demolition can be obtained, then just walk away and build elsewhere like anyone else. I would be interested in your contact so far with NZHPT.

Dear Councillors,

Firstly thank you for the opportunity to submit to your annual plan, and for Councils ongoing support for our efforts at Dudding Lake.

Last year the Trust applied to Council for help with the tar-sealing of the drive into the lake, which was approved to the tune of 7 to 8K. Our request is for this money to be carried over to this financial year, plus any addition the Council sees fit. The work to seal the drive is planned to commence in October with help from Higgins, community trusts and part use of the Council's grant to run the lake. (All of this is provisional on finalising funding)

Secondly the ablution block at the lake urgently needs re-roofing. Two years ago we painted the roof to try and extend its life, however it now appears that it did not work for as long as we had hopped. Councils help is now sort for the replacement of the roof. As a trust we are more than comfortable with normal maintenance of the facilities at the Lake, however we feel the re-roofing is a capital item of expenditure that does not belong with the Trust.



Whilst I have no objections to what is proposed for the Annual Plan 16/17 I feel that the Council has lost its way in other directions. Remember the old saying about 1st impressions? To digress slightly, there are two types of visitor to Marton; the willing and the unwilling. The willing visitor usually arrives via well kept pleasant roads (Wellington Road. Turakina Road and Calico Line) but the unwilling visitor coming from the south is the one diverted off Highway 1 for some reason.

After leaving Bulls the first sign that Marton exists is a signboard with a heart shape on it with Marton heart of the Rangitikei . Contained within the heart shape are a lot of symbols totally undeciferable at !00 kmh. Not a good start. Surely a sheep, tractor and a cow within the heart would be better and more easily seen.

Continuing along Highway 1 the signposts to Marton are ignored until the travellor reaches the overhieght turnoff where a diversionis in place. This diversion takes the traveller down what is little more that a country lane until they reach some houses and a 50kmh speed restriction. The houses appear to be well kept but on the other side of the road shows neglect and a disused racecourse which looks even more neglected. Continuing on there are vacant sections, some neat and tidy. Others very neglected and whats this; cattle being raised on a vacant house section, surely no Council would permit this? Round the corner, m or vacant sections again some cared for, others neglected and whats this? An abandoned car amid the overgrown grass.

The unwilling visitor is beginning to get an unfavourable impression but more is to come. Over the raiway lines and on past neatly decorated houses to the corner, I would like a cup of tea but how do I get into the town. No signposts only small signs to point the way back to the main highway. Right on the junction ia house sitting in the middle of a hideous mess, not a good advertisement for the occupants, the town or the council. Turn right into a street that has no roadside kerbing although it appears that the sideroads and all neatly kerbed and whats this? Another house section with large livestock appears, alpaccas in the main and so on into another narrow road with a nasty twist or so until a last areasonable road is reached and a signboard infrs that the trip has beeb through the outskirts of Marton.

So what is impression gained? Not a good one; on the one hand that of house owners learing for their property and on the other that of a council which neglects its duties and has no interest in presenting a well managed and cared for town.

Council should be mindful of the fact that a bad impression is the one that lasts and that it a total waste of money creating a beatiful town centre if the approaches to the town have alreadt created a bad impression. Certainly the degree of Council neglect that can be observed on this short trip through the outskirts of Marton iis enough to deter an unwilling vistor to Marton and cause them to pass this impression on to their friends or is this what Council wants?



1. WEST TAIHAPE NAME

Name of area "West Taihape" or "Taihape West"

Clearly we need a positive name. The name itself indicates there is a clearly defined area for a reason.

There was a slip in Valley Road due to blocked drains. Now the drains have been cleared there is minimal movement. The authorities by their actions (have stopped measuring) indicates there is a significantly reduced risk.

Propose the name be changed and all authorities, Council and staff refer to the area as "West Taihape".

2. COMMITMENT TO MAINTAIN CLEAR DRAINS AND WATERWAYS IN WEST TAIHAPE

The Council has been proactive:

- a) In clearing the waterways behind Kiwi Road and the stream through Kaka Road to the O'Taihape Valley stream.
- b) Replacing drains in Kaka Road (down from Hospital Road and Thrush, Kaka & Wren Streets) also repairing the drain down from Paradise Terrace corner.

This work allows storm water to drain quickly - excellent (previously overflowing with minimal surface water).

We now need regular spraying of water ways and clearing at least annually.

The storm water drains need clearing monthly at least and more often in winter.

The street sweeper does a great job however regular spraying must be undertaken as part of the maintenance programme (good to see some spraying done after being raised last month). This should happen without rate payer input.

3. REPAIR WATER SUPPLY LEAKS IMMEDIATELY

There should be a policy for all water leaks to be repaired immediately.

Also a programme to replace the water supply overtime in West Taihape.

The replacement of the water supply line in the top end of Kaka road is a great start.

I noticed the ground was considerably dryer than the drains when replaced (Kaka Road, Thrush & Wren Street) across the road a few years ago. This clearly demonstrates the drainage is now working. Drains through to the storm water not drains going nowhere in the ground or blocked / collapsed.

The fire hydrant outside 50 Kaka Road was repaired several years ago. The leak has been leaking for many years and was long overdue (the Council spent a few days to get repaired).

4. ACTIVELY REDUCE THE ZONE WHERE PRACTICAL

As the above measures manage the drainage and capture spring water the area West Taihape is re-assessed.

When areas are no longer at any risk the boundaries of West Taihape be reduced.

There be an active policy to review the boundaries annually.

5. POSITIVE ANNOUNCEMENTS TO CLEARLY DESCRIBE THE WEST TAIHAPE AREA

The Council staff be all required to describe the area as "West Taihape" not using any other reference. Over time this will become known and accepted as "West Taihape" and become common practice.

This will enhance the area's image and the public will make their own judgement as to the risk. Through LIM Reports etc the appropriate management (building conditions etc) can be undertaken.

In conclusion, The Council has completed a lot to stabilise the area and creating effective drainage and maintaining clear drains (spraying and keeping storm water drains free of rubbish) will ensure the area is kept safe and avoid any future issues.



Submission to Annual Plan. Re; Wasp Control in Taihape Scenic Reserves.

During the course of our work controlling Old man's Beard, and other weeds, in the Taihape Scenic Reserves over recent years, our workers have been doing quite a lot of wasp nest control. This was primarily for self-defence, but it obviously had a beneficial effect on the surrounding areas of the town.

We obtained a supply of chemical for the purpose from the Taihape Community Development Trust, who had found it somewhere around the Town Hall, but that supply has now run out. In the meantime, controls around the supply and use of these chemicals has been tightened, so our workers will not now be able to obtain and use them.

We recommend that the Council implement a formal programme, with a qualified operator, to undertake this wasp control work, in the Taihape Scenic Reserves, and other areas around town, as necessary.
