Cr Belsham: We would commit a representative to your steering group? Answer: Yes, each territorial authority appoints their own representative. Cr Gordon: What capacity does Sport Manawatū have for new builds? Answer: I oversee projects across the seven territorial authorities. Our role is to coordinate and identify specialists. Cr Dalgety: Where are we in your current three year term? Answer: Some councils did not adopt our framework at the time, so we worked on those councils that did adopt it. The idea is it would roll over every three years to align with Long Term Plans. Cr Wilson: What is your relationship with Whanganui Council?

The other six territorial authorities did not have pre-existing relationships, so we are looking to make it a shared leadership role with the Whanganui Council.
