1 Executive Summary

- 1.1 The Creative Communities Scheme is a relationship between Creative New Zealand and local authorities, and supports opportunities for New Zealanders to participate in the arts in their local area. Each local authority has an assessment panel representative of its community, and these panels make the funding decisions.
- 1.2 This report outlines the Creative Communities (Creative New Zealand) Funding Scheme, and presents the applications received for this funding round for the Funding Assessment Committee to consider.
- 1.3 Five eligible applicants have requested a total of \$13,721.94 which is \$5,649.94 more than the total sum recommended for this round (\$8,072.00).

2 Background

- 2.1 The purpose of the Creative Communities Scheme is to increase participation in the arts at the local level and to increase the range and diversity of arts available to communities. Creative New Zealand sets criteria for funding which are listed later in this report.
- 2.2 In 2005, the Council agreed to delegate the identification of local priorities for the Scheme to the Funding Assessment Committee. The local priorities were reviewed and confirmed by the Committee at its meeting in September 2013.
- 2.3 Creative New Zealand require all territorial authorities participating in the Creative Communities scheme to hold a minimum of two and a maximum of four funding rounds each year. Rangitikei District Council holds two funding rounds per annum. This is the first application round for the 2018/19 year.
- 2.4 The availability of these grants was advertised in local newspapers in September 2018 (in the District Monitor, Feilding-Rangitikei Herald and Wanganui Chronicle) and was notified on the Council's website and Facebook page. An email advising the committee members as well as the schools in the

district was also circulated. An agenda item and information pack was including in all of the community committee and board meetings.

3 Application process and criteria

3.1 The Scheme has three criteria for assessing applications and allocating funding. Projects should meet at least one of these criteria:

- **Broad Community involvement:** The project will create opportunities for local communities to engage with and participate in the arts.
- **Diversity:** the project will support the diverse arts and cultural traditions of local communities, enriching and promoting their uniqueness and cultural diversity.
- **Young people:** the project will enable and encourage young people (under 18 years) to engage with and actively participate in the arts.

3.2 The Rangitikei Creative Communities Committee have further decided to prioritise projects which:

- **Encourage the transfer of skills**
- **Develop and support a local artistic community**
- **Demonstrate growth over time**

3.3 Creative New Zealand states in its Administrators Guide that *“...one of the greatest strengths of the Creative Communities Scheme is that these funding criteria are broad and flexible, allowing assessment committees to make decisions that take into account the local context. Committees are encouraged to apply the funding criteria according to the community arts needs within their own local council’s area”*.

3.4 Activities that may be funded include:

- Exhibitions, concerts and workshops
- Personnel costs for one-off, short-term projects and material costs
- Artist development
- Arts promotion
- Community participation and engagement
- Support for the arts of ethnic communities
- Projects focussing on young people
- Projects linked to other sectors –arts projects linked to other sectors such as health, heritage or environment, provided that the project’s main focus is to achieve arts outcomes.

3.5 The application form provided by Creative New Zealand has a space on the front cover to list the local priorities but does not have a specific place within the application for the applicant to rank their application against the local criteria.

- 3.6 The annual amount available to Rangitikei District from Creative New Zealand is \$16,144.75 (incl GST). The annual fund allocation for 2018/19 is \$15,814 plus \$330.75 rolled over from last year. \$8,072.00 (50%) has been allocated for the first round.

4 Applications received

- 4.1 Five applications have been received to meet the closing deadline for this funding round.
- 4.2 The applications are supplied separately and summarised in the spreadsheet ([Appendix 1](#)). This shows how each application relates to the criteria. The amount requested by the applicants totals \$13,721.94 and the eligible costs total \$13,957.63.
- 4.3 The applications are also available online:

- 4.4 All of the five applicants have received various grants in the past. Project reports have been received for all of these applications.
- 4.5 Barry Williams is yet to provide quotes. All other applications are complete.
- 4.6 Three applications are above the \$2,500 normal limit set by Creative New Zealand. These are for the Taihape Community Development Trust – Community Inspired signage, Turakina Caledonian Society, and the Marton Players. Creative New Zealand requires applications at this level to be highly developed with clearly defined budgets and event planning, and to be of widespread benefit. The applications contain detailed budgets; the application from most of these groups contain some costs that cannot be covered by the Scheme. The Committee may like to pick specific costs from this application to fund. The Committee will need to decide on the merit of the applications whether it may be willing to fund above the \$2,500 suggested limit.

5 Assessing applications

- 5.1 All New Zealanders are eligible to apply to the Creative Communities Scheme (Creative New Zealand), either as individuals or groups. In principle, the Creative Communities Scheme offers support for *projects* rather than support for *individuals*. All applications are assessed according to the merit of the project based on the Creative Communities Scheme criteria and to be considered all applications must identify the benefits of the proposed project to the local community.
- 5.2 A marking sheet will be circulated to all Committee members in advance of the meeting. These should be completed by Committee members **prior** to the meeting in November 2018. The assessment sheet is by no means binding: on several occasions, committee members change their mind about an application

as the process goes forward. However, it can be useful to highlight where there is clear consensus amongst committee members about a particular application.

5.3 Creative New Zealand advises that “It is preferable to adequately support the best applications to ensure that they have a good chance of success”.

5.4 Given that the amount sought exceeds the amount available, the Committee might wish to consider a priority ranking approach in order to satisfy the scheme’s overriding requirement; to fund for success. This could include the timing of the projects and the timing of future funding rounds.

6 Project Report Forms

6.1 Project report forms are required from all successful applicants within two months of the completion of the project and certainly before further grants can be awarded. Project Report Forms for the 2017/18 funding round have been received from:

1. The idea/Te kaupapa: What do you want to do?

To stage the 155th Turakina Highland Games.
The Turakina Highland Games is the oldest Highland Games in New Zealand and one that is very highly regarded in the Scottish community. It is considered an iconic Rangitikei event and is one of only two events in New Zealand that offer a full program of Highland events including solo piping, drumming, Highland and National Dancing, traditional Field Events and a pipe band competition.
In 2019 the New Zealand Open Solo Piping Competition will be part of the program, this will see the best pipers in the country present along with many additional supporters.

There is an emphasis on making Turakina the perfect place to bring young pipers, drummers and dancers to begin their involvement in these arts. This is borne out by the number of entrants we see in the lower grades of the events. We are also seeing growing numbers of Youth Bands entered in the band competition.
As competitors have progressed through the grades they have become regular attendees and are now passing on their experience and knowledge and providing inspiration for the younger players.

The Highland Games is held on the Turakina Domain which has very limited facilities. It is also held in the middle of summer and there is very little shade. For the past four years we have hired marquees, tables and chairs to provide a place for people to watch events while being able to get out of the sun and to provide an area for additional arts activities.

We endeavour to provide a family day at an affordable price so our gate charge is kept to a moderate fee and children under 15 years are free. We are only able to do this because of the financial support we receive through grants.

Our intention is to encourage people to learn about Scottish culture and to become involved in Scottish art forms.

2. The process/Te whakatutuki: How will the project happen?

The 155th Turakina Highland Games will be held in Turakina on the Friday evening of the 25th January 2019 and all day Saturday 26th January.
On Friday evening there will be a lament played at the Turakina Cemetery followed by an official opening and welcome at the Ben Nevis Tavern.
On Saturday the full Highland Games and New Zealand Open Solo Piping Championships will take place on the Turakina Domain, Cameron Road, Turakina and neighbouring properties.
The events include solo piping, solo drumming, pipe bands, Highland and National dancing, traditional Scottish field events and childrens games. Clan stalls and market stalls including food and refreshments are around the field.
Many of the Clan stalls display Celtic crafts including spinning and weaving.

In the evening a live band will play in the marquee. They play a combination of traditional ceilidh and contemporary music.

Twelve months of planning goes in to putting the event together. The committee and helpers are all volunteers, while the many, very experienced, adjudicators give their time and expertise for a nominal fee and costs.

PROJECT DETAILS

3. The people/Ngā tāngata: Tell us about the key people and/or the groups involved.

The Turakina Caledonian Society organise the Highland Games each year. The committee has many years experience and is made up of people from a range of backgrounds, interests and professions.

Volunteers, local people and those that travel from further afield, come to set up and pack up the grounds, work as stewards and scrutineers, prepare food for the workers, provide accomodation for visitors along with various other tasks on the day.

Many groups come together to support the committee and to provide man power on the days of the event. Turakina School and the Turakina CWI run stalls to fundraise and the Marton Lions man the gate, collecting admission fees and arranging the parking.

Because the event has outgrown the Turakina Domain locals have allowed us to overflow into their private property. The farm next door is used for parking and camping. The primary school also allow camping and pipe bands to use their grounds for tuning while the private garden adjacent to the Domain is used to accomodate one of the principle solo piping boards.

Around 25 Scottish Clans have stalls providing information and displays for our visitors, the Royal Alexandra Scottish Regiment from Linton attend, they have a static display and help and take part in events.

Two Highland Dancing organisations, MRW Scottish Offical Board and Thistle Highland Dancing, run the Highland & National Dancing competitions.

The judges are all highly respected in their fields and are bought in from as far away as Waipu in the north and Christchurch in the south. Judges are bought into the district to ensure their impartiality and to provide a new perspective and pointers to competitors in their reports.

Because we are holding the NZ Solo Piping Champs we are required to have a bigger pool of judges than normal.

4. The criteria/ Ngā paearu: Tell us how this project will deliver to your selected criterion: access and participation, diversity or young people.

The Turakina Highland Games is a focal point for this small rural community, it is an event that brings the local people together to work on a common project. Local organisations including the Turakina School, Country Women's Institute and Lions also use it as a fundraising opportunity.

The Turakina area has a strong Scottish heritage making up a considerable part of the diverse cultural makeup of the Rangitikei district. Many families have been attending the Highland Games for multipule generations and a lot of the visitors from outside the Rangitikei return to Turakina annually to attend. The event is a favourite on the pipe band and Highland Dancing calendars.

The Games is seen as the perfect opportunity for young pipers, drummers and dancers to perform for the first time in a competition environment. They are judged by experianced, well respected national and international adjudicators who provide valuable, positive feedback to encourage growth in their chosen art form. It allows them the opportunity to mix with their peers and watch and learn from the experianced performers. It is seen as the ideal time to encourage young people to start learning the various disipline which are being displayed. The Highland Dancing schools and pipe bands take the opportunity to advertise their learners programmes.

Each year the organisers work to grow and enhance the event, by improving the organisational aspects and by including different events and displays.

Turakina is known for its Highland Games and surprisingly many people around New Zealand and internationally know of this small village because of this Scottish Gathering.

The 155th Turakina Highland Games

The 155th Turakina Highland Games and New Zealand Open Solo Piping Championships will take place at the Turakina Reserve, Cameron Road, Turakina on Saturday the 26th January 2019. The Turakina Highland Games were first held in 1864 and are the oldest continuously running on land sporting event in New Zealand. This is an event of historical importance to the village of Turakina, the Rangitikei and is part of the network of piping, dancing and highland sports in New Zealand. It is an event that brings the locals together, working toward a common goal.

The official opening for the Games will take place on the Friday evening at the Ben Nevis Tavern and will include a recital by a prominent piper. This brings some welcome revenue into one of the local businesses. The Official Opening is preceded by a lament played at the local cemetery over looking the village. This was first introduced at the 150th Games and proved very successful with a large crowd making the trek from the Main Road up to the cemetery. It has now been permanently added to the programme.

The Highland Games offer a full traditional programme. The morning will see the solo pipers, solo drummers and the Highland and National dancers competing. The Pipe Bands take to the centre of the arena in the afternoon. With the 2019 New Zealand Piping Championships being held in conjunction with the Highland Games, competitors and supporters are expected from all over New Zealand. Adjudicators from around New Zealand, Australia and Canada have been secured to judge and provide feedback to competitors.



Throughout the day the traditional Field Events prove very popular with visitors of all ages. The chance to learn to toss the caber, toss the sheaf, carry the stones, shot put or do the Farmers Walk brings out the competitive streak in many. Events are broken up into age groups and male and female to encourage participation. There is also the tug-of-war or for the really ambitious the Ben Nevis Hill Run.

The little ones are also catered for with lunch time games including old favourites like the tattie and spoon race and the three legged and sack races or finding the Needle in a Haystack. Or if they want something less vigorous there is the colouring in and activities under a shady gazebo. There is also a bouncy castle on site.

Many Clans are represented amongst the Clan Stalls, they are happy to chat and help visitors research family histories and find Clan affiliations. The Market place is always popular and is growing. Local stall holders selling local produce are mixed in amongst Celtic themed stalls and information sites.

This year a "Give it a Try" area is being set up in the marquee to encourage people, particularly young people to try out instruments associated with pipe bands and provide contact information if they wish to begin learning.

As the Turakina Domain has no permanent structures apart from a roof over the main dancing stage and two garages; a large marquee was introduced at the 150th Games to provide a shaded seating area for everyone. This proved so popular that it has become a regular feature. Along with the much appreciated shade it has also proved to be the ideal area to stage other events and displays.

The afternoon rounds off with a massed bands display at the end of the band competition. This is followed by a traditional Haggis Ceremony held in the marquee. The presentation of awards completes the formal part of the day.

An evening bar-b-que is available with tickets sold through out the day and the Ceilidh begins. This is a free community event. A live band plays, in 2019 the band will again be "Bowmore" playing their mixture of Celtic folk music and more contemporary numbers, ideal to dance the night away. The Turakina School Friends and Whanau group will run a licensed cash bar as a fundraiser for the local primary school.



The Turakina Highland Games is a popular event on the Pipe Band calendar and while it attracts New Zealand champions in piping, drumming and dancing it is also seen as the perfect springboard for younger competitors beginning in these arts. It is an event where age barriers disappear, the more experienced players are happy to share their wisdom and the younger ones are keen to learn and rub shoulders with these mentors.

For the spectators it is often a chance to catch up with old friends and family. In some cases several generations have been coming to the Games.

It is an event that allows local community groups to fundraise. The Turakina CWI, Marton Lions and Turakina School use the opportunity to profit from visitors to the area. The school opens it's pool to visitors for a small charge as well.

The organising committee work hard to get a mix of the old favourite events, while introducing new events and displays to keep the Games current and interesting.

Because the Highland Games is growing in reputation and popularity it has outgrown the Turakina Reserve but thanks to the support of locals it has been able to spill over into nearby properties. The prestigious A Grade Piobaireachd solo piping event is now held in an adjacent private garden, the farmland surrounding the Domain is made available for parking and camping and the Turakina School allow the use of their grounds for campers and for bands to tune up.

The gate fees are deliberately kept low to make this an event that is affordable for families from all walks of life. The event attracts around 2000 people including competitors and spectators.

The committee works hard to get funding from many different sources to allow this to happen.

Financial reserves are held by the Society to guard against the losses that would be incurred if we were to have a rainy Games day.

Any profit goes toward further improvements and maintenance.

Reporting Base

Turakina Caledonian Society Incorporated is an incorporated society registered under the Incorporated Societies Act 1908 and a registered charity under the Charities Act 2005.

Measurement Base

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis.

Accounting Policies

The Society is a Public Benefit Entity as it is a registered charity

The financial statements are prepared in accordance with New Zealand generally accepted accounting practice being the Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting – Accrual PBE SFR-A (NFP). (Tier 3)

Grants

Grants received are recognised in the statement of financial performance when the requirements under the grant agreement have been met. Any grants for which the requirements under the grant agreement have not been completed are carried as liabilities until all the conditions have been fulfilled.

Investment income

Interest income is accounted for as earned except for term deposits where interest is only payable when maturity of the investment occurs.

Inventories

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost is determined on a first in, first out basis.

Accounts receivable

Accounts receivable are carried at estimated realisable value after providing against debts where collection is doubtful.

Property, plant and equipment

Initial recording

The cost of purchased property, plant and equipment is the value of the consideration given to acquire the assets and the value of other directly attributable costs which have been incurred in bringing the assets to the location and condition necessary for their intended service.

Each year, the senior children from all of the local primary schools (Marton Junction, James Cook, St Matthews, Marton Primary, Huntley, South Makirikiri) will be invited to participate in a poppy making project to coincide with ANZAC Day and the placement of wooden crosses by the RSA.

The children will make 2 ceramic poppies, secured to stainless steel welding rods, and glazed to poppy/ANZAC red. The children will keep one for themselves, while the other will be placed on the bank in front of the cenotaph in ANZAC Park. The children will create and fire the poppies under the direction of Jeanette Henderson from the Marton Arts and Crafts Centre, using MACC kiln, personnel and equipment.

The poppies will be placed at the cenotaph once the RSA have placed their wooden crosses. The Mayor will make a short speech. The poppies will remain there until the crosses are removed (approximately 2 weeks). The poppies will then be collected and stored by the Rangitikei District Council, ready for placement next year. Each year, the number of crosses will grow until after about 10 years, there will be approximately 1000 poppies to be displayed each ANZAC Day.

2018 was the first year of our 10 year project and it was a tremendous success with many compliments being offered both about the beauty of the poppies and the scope of the project for the Marton Community.

The change in scope of the project to focus on tweens and teens and the mothers created a beautiful dynamic and eye opening learning for them both. We also changed the way that we were filming the event from previous events which lead to much greater depth of storytelling. The end result is that the main story arc of the short film will take place in Bulls.

We were able to engage local talent to come and help share their skills with the women and girls, from belly dancing classes, to yoga breaks, and learning the art of mindful eating. We drew, we wrote, we danced, we photographed, some even covered themselves in the golden clay (18 and older only after the other families left for the day).

My goal with this event was to move it from an event that just benefited the women and girls who attended it. To be one where the body positive spirit of the event was paid forward into the communities. It feels like this was reached by this group. One section of the event was the participants all planning how they were going to move this into their community one by one.

We had a reporter from Fairfax there for the entire event and she did a beautiful write up that went nationwide and featured in the Dominion post as well as the local papers.

We had two false starts with this project in the region. The first was scheduling it in Taihape and then on visiting the venue realizing that the bathroom was between the library and the hall which for our purposes would not provide enough privacy for the women who took part in the evening body clay section.

The second was our first attempt at marketing lead to only two takers after several weeks of effort.

In the end what worked was putting out a casting call for the movie. We had just under 100 apply and then 45 actually show up for the filming which worked out to be just a perfect amount.

It seems that advertising for a body positive event isn't shareable on social media...we think this is because it may come off as telling your friends they have issues with their body. However, sharing a casting call is completely appropriate and encouraged. We have found this successful in several regions now. Learning heaps about the human psyche from doing it that is for sure.

Striving for generation mojo

Mandi Lynn says she wants to promote the art of protecting girl power.

Mandi Lynn is calling for a stop to body shaming and she is joining forces with women from all over the country to create her film Finding Venus. Reporter Carly Thomas stepped into the circle.

It's the end of a long day. It's cold – country halls always are – and I am standing in front of a lighting setup. The black-eyed lens of a camera is looking at me. I am naked from the waist up.

I have three words written on my body – strong, capable, feminine – [Mandi Lynn](#) wrote them on me in silver paint. She is wearing gold and we sparkle at each other. The black-eyed lens winks at me. I am these words.

Negative words written on participants' bodies were wiped off to make way for positive words.

Another woman wipes black words from her torso – damaged goods, weak. She is not these words. The word brave takes their place. She raises her chin, her eyes are bullets, her face defiant.

Seeing positive words take the place of negative ones was a simple but powerful exercise in body positivity.

And we have been brave, a hall full of strangers, daughters in tow, travelling from Whanganui, Palmerston North, Wellington and Feilding. We have all come because of one woman, her [body-positivity film](#) and her message that we can change the world.

And at the end of the day, laughing, talking in earnest, making plans, there is a feeling that a shift has occurred and it is a powerful one that we now want to urgently take out of this room.

It's why she does what she does. Lynn is driven to change the way women think about their bodies. She is beyond scared about the negativity in our girls and the way women are portrayed in the media. It's been a 14-hour day for her. I haven't seen her sit down once, but this is a battle that she is prepared for and she is not going to stop.

The reason to fight goes way back for Lynn. Originally from the United States, she was in the military for 10 years, where she was regularly measured and weighed. She now hates scales with a vengeance and she doesn't rate the images that we are thrown on social media either; as an award-winning photographer she knows just how unreal they can be.

Thigh-gap obsession, photoshopped models, unrealistic body portrayal, body shaming – "all negative, all destructive". Curves, wrinkles, stretch marks, post-breastfeeding boobs, wobbly bums – "all beautiful, all real".

"I went through a journey where I was so negative to myself, I didn't like what I saw when I looked in the mirror, I didn't look how I was supposed to look." But when her creativity, her time and her energy were getting sucked into a black hole of extreme doubt, she went on an "inner world tour". Lynn stopped worrying about "crap that didn't matter".

She decided that the world needed to be stopped in its inherited body-shame ways when her 5-year-old niece asked her, "Aunty Mandi, am I fat?"

"It was like looking down the barrel of a gun to have her say that at such a young age."

Lynn started researching and talking to women. What she found was that their self-esteem peaks at the age of 9, only 20 per cent of 18-year-old women are happy with their bodies and the body shapes and sizes splashed all over print and social media represent only about 5 per cent of the female population.

The other 95 per cent are represented here, in this hall on a cold day in Bulls. Many say they feel the pressure and the pain of those unreal statistics daily; others say they want to change it and all say they are worried about the next generation.

Lynn says her film and her work with women while making it are ways to change the conversation and to create the "generation mojo".

"What if our daughters and our granddaughters took it as a right to be happy in their own skin? What if it seemed really weird and ridiculous that you could hate your own body?" – Lynn meets the eyes of a teenage girl, her baseball cap shadowing her face – "this gift that has been given to you so you can do cool stuff in the world."

There are smiles at that – sly, shy ones from the teens and a wide encouraging one from Lynn. "That's the generation mojo. That's the generation we want to not worry about this stuff."

"What I want is to call on mothers to face our own stuff so that we can show our girls a different way. And I don't know how to make it all stop, but I know it's possible. If we can dream it, it can happen."

The "stuff" and the "crap" are here with us in this hall. We divide into mums, girls, tweens and teens and we are asked questions and told to step to the line if the answer is a yes. It becomes clear that the adults have all felt hate towards their bodies, that we all judge others and many would rather look different than they do.

Our teens are the most affected – they move as an entity to that centre line, a union of negative thoughts. All have been called a nasty name,

they have all felt pressured to look a certain way and they all worry about the way they look.

The girls under 10? Well, they think they are awesome, they see beauty in others and they all dance their way up to the line when they are asked if they feel more in their bodies than their minds. They are so far free from the "constant noise of negative thoughts".

A belly dancing session is held as part of a day of body-positive workshops and discussions at the Bulls Town Hall.

We belly dance in a circle, we do yoga and we learn from a nutritionist that diets "absolutely do not work, they just don't". We listen, we write down our "crap", we crumple the pages into an insignificant ball while our kids chit chat their way to being instant friends.

This bunch of strangers share food, we swap ideas and plans on how to take this out into our communities and we do what a group of women do well – we laugh uproariously, we support each other and we create a joint energy that almost hums.

And then we get to here, standing half naked in a cold hall with a woman who is not only writing the word strong on my arm, she is handing on her trust and her absolute conviction that we, as women, can change the inheritance of shame.

Mandi Lynn received funding from Creative Communities for the Finding Venus: Rangitīkei Style day and has backing from the New Zealand Film Commission.

Providing shade continues to be a problem and something we will keep investigating.

Potential customers were attracted to the many local artisan's stalls we had on site. They seemed to be doing very good business.

The highlight of the day was the number of Youth Pipe Bands competing including first timers Lewis Turrell Memorial Pipe Band from Hamilton and Napier Schools Pipe Band while Hawera Youth Pipe Band were back after a break from competing.

We look forward to the 155th Turakina Highland Games next year on Saturday 26th January 2019. The New Zealand Open Piping Championships have been awarded to Turakina in 2019. This will mean the best solo pipers from all around the country will be here to compete for titles. This will also bring a larger audience. We hope to put on an event which will impress them.





Tents were the order of the day at the hottest ever Turakina Highland Games on Saturday. Competitors around the two stages for highland dance contests came well prepared with all forms of tent technology.

To beat the extreme heat, the Piobaireachd piping contest was held in the Chapman family's shady garden, next to the Turakina Domain ... a very popular venue for the event.

New Zealand's longest running Highland games is in good heart, once more attracting 1500 visitors, including hundreds of clan members from all over the country, to enjoy the sights and sounds of competitive Highland games. Fourteen pipe bands, including four youth bands, competed - with the NZ Police Pipe Band winning the contest. Stuart Easton from



Palmerston North won the A grade piping. Douglas Bilsland won the title for A grade solo drummer. Changes to the layout saw the stalls in a more central location and band contests closer to the spectator tent. With the temperature soaring, the ice cream and drink sellers proved very popular.



Timing was good:

The success of this project started in June with the advertising and word of mouth in promoting the workshops and the idea behind creating signs for Gumboot Day and other events in Taihape.

- Advert (Poster announcing workshops)
- Create and Decorate a Giant Gumboot 4 Workshops – Advert in Talk UP Taihape Newsletter.

Using Art Tutors worked well:

Each Tutor brought their own individual skills and buzz with them. The outcomes were varied and enabled participants to learn new skills and express themselves in a whole new way.

Tutors provided many of their own materials:

Having the Tutors provide examples of how their medium and specific materials could be used to create a finished piece was inspiring for the participants and motivating.

To scale wooden Gumboots were provided to give a feel of the final product:

Gary Johnson (Trusteed), cut out to scale wooden Gumboots with sheets provided by the Trust that could be used to decorate; heavy paper templates, also to size, were provided for those who preferred to use them.

Changing the project to have four finished signs was exciting:

Limiting the workshops to three to be able to afford four finished signs enabled the Taihape public to see the finished products which were used to advertise the Spring Fling Community BBQ. Public feedback was very positive and we hope that this will motivate more people to get involved with the next stage of this project.

TCDT ensured all the information, plus promotion, went to schools and general public on the six-hour workshops to provide general **access** in a friendly, neutral space.

RDC generously provided free use of Venue in the Taihape Town Hall Supper Rooms.

Free activities mean everyone can participate:

Tea and coffee were provided, attendees were only required to bring their lunch, everything else was laid on.

Supervision for under 12yrs

Tutors were uncertain as to how young children would cope without supervision which was then made a requirement. A staff or Trust member was at each workshop to assist and provide extra support for Tutors and participants alike.
