

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

### 9 Update on the Small Projects Fund

The current balance is \$4,615. The only payment to date is \$500 approved at the Board's last meeting for The Army Depot.<sup>1</sup> Since then, two further projects have been reviewed at the Boards' workshop on 4 November 2015:

#### Birds on signs

At its previous meeting, the Board noted that the Birds on Sign project was applying for funding from the Creative Communities scheme, whose Assessment Committee met on 25 November 2015, awarding a grant of \$3,000.

Etain McDonell from Birds on signs gave a presentation to the Board's workshop on 4 November 2015. The consensus was that \$1,000 be granted from the Small Project Fund, to be ratified at this meeting and that the Board would write a letter of support for further funding applications for a walking map and information booklet about the project and the artists involved in it.

#### Recommendations

- 1. That the Taihape Community Board grants \$1,000 from the Small projects Fund to support the Birds on Signs project.
- 2. That the Chair of the Taihape Board sends a letter of support for further funding applications by the Birds on Signs project in Taihape for a walking map and information booklet about the project and the artists involved in it.

#### Mangaweka Hall hireage

During the weekend 14-15 November 2015 the Mangaweka Hall was used for Fakes and Forgeries and the Christmas Fair. At workshop, the Board considered it reasonable to cover the hall hireage costs, which (taking into account the discount for local, non-profit organisations) is \$109.60.

#### Recommendation

That the Taihape Community Board pays \$109.60 from the Small Projects Fund to cover hireage costs for the Mangaweka Hall during 14-15 November 2015, while used for Fakes and Forgeries and the town Christmas Fair.

The Board of Trustees Chair was very supportive of such an initiative, and a resolution of approval for the concept will be sought at the next Board meeting on 25 November 2015.

A suggestion at the Board's last meeting was for the Taihape Town Co-ordinator to attend the Makeover workshop in Marton. This will take place 8-14 February 2016. The information night (with David Engwicht) is on 8 December 2015.

### 1 Apologies

There were no apologies.

### 2 Public Forum

Mr Rex Bond and Mr Darryll Hesketh speaking on renting rooms at the old Taihape College site.

Mr Bond and Mr Hesketh tabled their proposal to rent/lease the original Music Suite rooms at the old Taihape College site. Their intention was to set up some of the rooms as a dedicated recording facility and use the others for rehearsal and storage. This would then become a music hub for local artists to use. Mr Bond spoke on the recording project that they were currently involved with. This involved the recording of a compilation album from local musicians and singers. It was envisaged that all proceeds from album sales would go to a local charity. Mr Hesketh said that he was keen to see some of the iconic buildings saved. The pair were seeking the Board's support for this proposal.

His Worship the Mayor advised that Council was still waiting for the Ministry of Education to provide a MoU to occupy the existing buildings. He was keen that the Board have a role in deciding which groups would be suitable to make use of these spaces. It was suggested that the Board meet on site with all interested parties.

Ms Katene Peretini, MrTony Downey and Mr Oliver Sanderson spoke the Waharoa Carving project.

Representatives from the Waiouru Army Depot tabled drawings and spoke on the Waharoa carving project that the Army Depot had commissioned. Mr Downey said that the Waharoa carving recognises the journey that embraces the transition from civilian to soldier as well as acknowledging past and present significant events. He said that local lwi had already sourced the totara and that five master carvers would be working on the project in order to have it finished for the unveiling on 21 November 2015.

The group was asking that the Board give consideration to being a sponsor through making a donation.

The Chair thanked the representatives and advised that the Board would discuss this request later in the Agenda.

Cr Rainey said that she would like to see any Mangaweka projects etc included in this report. This then led onto a discussion on Ward boundaries. The Chair reported that she had requested detailed Ward maps from Councils IT department. Once received, she would forward on to Board Members.

His Worship the Mayor reported that as there had been some interest regarding the liquefaction, an article would be submitted to the local paper. A public meeting with representatives from Council and Horizons would then be held.

He then outlined his recent trip to Melbourne where he had attended the Australasia China Cities Summit/Business Forum. Following that around 50 of the Chinese delegation visited Palmerston North where they attended the Trade and Investments event. This event showcased the region to potential investors. It was here that a number of local businesses made a presentation, one being Incept Marine who were very well received.

Also discussed was the landlocked issue. His Worship the Mayor said that Rangitikei was significantly affected; however, he believed that Council was slowly making progress with this issue.



### Introduction

In 2008/09 the Wanganui Rural Community Board held a series of meetings to identify the needs and priorities of the rural community. As a result, the Board developed *Rural Directions 2020*, a Ten Year Plan for the Board that covers the rural district and aligns with Wanganui District Council's planning processes. *Rural Directions 2020* was reviewed in 2012 and again in 2013 where its name was changed to *Rural Directions*. In this document the Wanganui Rural Community Board will be referred to as the 'Board' while the Wanganui District Council' will be referred to as the 'Council'.

# Rural Directions:

- Sets out a vision for Wanganui's rural community
- Sets out a mission for the Board
- Sets out six focus areas that will drive the Board's projects
- Provides a basis for the Board's submissions on key documents including, but not limited to, Wanganui District Council's and Horizons Regional Council's Ten Year Plans and Annual Plans

Rural Directions is a living document which is monitored and reviewed regularly.

### Context

The Wanganui Rural Community Board is a body established by statute. Its responsibilities and powers are delegated by the Wanganui District Council. It advocates for the rural sector, but also represents the Wanganui community on wider issues that are not specifically rural. The role of the Wanganui Rural Community Board is to:

- Represent and act as an advocate for the interest of the community
- Consider and report on all matters referred to it by Council, or any matter of interest or concern to the community
- Maintain an overview of services provided by Council within the community
- Prepare an annual submission to both the Regional and District Councils for expenditure and levels of service within the community
- Prepare submissions on central government legislation where there are implications for the rural community
- Communicate with community organisations and special interest groups within the community
- Exercise delegated authority to determine rural road closure applications
- Undertake any other responsibilities that are delegated to it by Council

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#### Successes

The Board punches well above its weight and has enjoyed a number of recent successes. These include:


- Award winning at the New Zealand Community Board's national biennial conference in May 2013. The recognition included:
  - Supreme Award for 'best practice' across all categories for the Board's work on rural broadband
  - Taking out the top award for the 'Leadership' category for the Board's work on rural broadband extension
  - A nomination for the 'Engaging Communities' category for the work and consultation that went in to the investigation of the effects of forestry on rural roads. The Board was also nominated for the 'Enhancing Communities' category for the work it did on its Ten Year Strategic Plan (this document)
  - The then *Rural Directions 2020* workshop, held by Chair Alan Taylor, which was the most preferred workshop, attracting a significant number of conference attendees
- Gaining speaking and voting rights at Council's main Committee meetings, which has given the rural
  community a stronger voice. Council gave the Board's representatives voting rights in 2012, and the
  new Council, elected in 2013, has continued this. The Board's representative at Council meetings has
  speaking rights.
- Incorporating the views of youth by inviting two representatives of Council's Youth Committee to its Board meetings and giving them speaking rights.
- Meeting with all rural communities in 2012 to update them on key issues from the Board's
  perspective and listening to issues raised by each community. A separate consultation round was
  undertaken specifically for the District Plan review.
- Board Chair, Alan Taylor named as Deputy Chair of Community Board's Zone 3 Executive Committee (Zone 3 reports through to the Community Board Executive Committee, a national organisation).

#### Representation across diverse communities

Wanganui's rural sector is not a single community of interest. Geographically, the District's rural area is significant and communities are diverse in terms of farming practice. Iffestyle, access, culture, employment, education, opportunities, and other issues such as levels of crime. One part of the community could have significant differences and desires from another. For example, Mowhanau is significantly different from Mangamahu. It is important the Board takes into account the multiple communities of interest and the various issues associated with each, so that each is adequately represented.



To promote strong and meaningful relationships within and beyond the Wanganui District.


# Projects

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# Focus Area 2: Rural Economic Growth

The rural sector is a significant contributor to the Wanganui economy, providing primary produce that supports major Wanganui industry and ancillary services. Important value added products and associated cutting-edge technology advancements in Wanganui are heavily associated with the rural sector. It is vital that the rural sector adapts to changing community expectations, environmental constraints, markets, and economic times.

Essentially, Wanganui's economy is rural-based. This is particularly so in the export area with the largest sector being meat and meat product manufacturing.

The table below sets out the top rural related activities and their contribution to local GDP in 2013.

# Projects

Identify economic trends, research and development projects and obstacles and opportunities in the rural sector and monitor industry changes and potential developments. Also:

- Examine value-added opportunities for local products
- Support tourism as a key aspect of rural economic development
- Examine irrigation issues and opportunities
- · Continue to advocate for ultrafast broadband throughout rural Wanganui
- Support projects and initiatives such as the Rural Enterprise Project.
- Provide input into key Council strategies and policies

# Focus Area 3: Infrastructure

Reliable and efficient infrastructure is vital to the economy, safety and connectedness of the rural sector. Infrastructure includes, but is not limited to:

- Roads
- Digital
- Power

### Key issues facing rural roads include


- Network vehicle volume low volume roads considered 'uneconomic'; impacts of increasing levels of heavy traffic, e.g. forestry; increases in heavy vehicle weight capacity
- Localised roading conditions drainage; speed: safety and maintenance concerns regarding impacts of increased heavy traffic on marginal and narrow pavement width; aggregate quality marginal high cost to import quality aggregate in remote areas; weak geological structure; slip prone
- Financial increase in emergency works (e.g. flood damage); higher expectations from stakeholders/road users; increasing operational costs and fluctuating raw material costs; decreasing subsidies from New Zealand Transport Agency (NZTA) and the Funding Assistance Rates (FAR) review

## Objective

To promote the importance of reliable and efficient infrastructure to rural Wanganui and ensure quality infrastructure systems are developed and maintained in a manner that reflects their inherent value to the wider district.

#### Projects

- · Assist with developing, monitoring and reviewing Council's Rural Road Strategy
- Continue working with other territorial authorities (local government) to determine a solution for managing the costs and options associated with the effects of forestry harvesting on rural roads
- In consultation with the wider region, redefine 'uneconomic roads'
- Continue to advocate for ultrafast broadband throughout rural Wanganui
- Lobby central government on various issues which relate to the provision of quality infrastructure



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# Focus Area 4: Community Wellbeing

Rural areas are geographically isolated from services, which means rural residents and businesses have restricted access to the support they need to ensure community wellbeing. Constraints include reduced access to:

- Healthcare services
- Education
- Welfare
- Fast. affordable broadband
- Entertainment and events
- Postal delivery
- Other issues related to community wellbeing include:
  - Emergency management
  - Community facilities

### Objective

To promote rural community wellbeing

## Projects

Consider rural services and initiatives including, but not limited to:

- Security and Police
- Council services such as library, animal control etc
- Postal services
- Good neighbour awareness
- Family events such as rural children's initiatives
- Continued liaison with the Fire Service and Wanganui's Rural Fire Authority, with a particular focus on Enlarged Rural Fire Districts
- Active participation in the Manawatu-Wanganui's Rural Co-ordination Group for a co-ordinated emergency management response to an emergency event
- Representation at the Safer Whanganui forum



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# Focus Area 5: Communication

Successful engagement with the community is critical to the effectiveness of the Board. Effective two-way communication between the Board and its stakeholders will contribute to effective rural representation and advocacy.



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# Focus Area 6: Representation

Wanganui Rural Community Board is elected by the rural community to represent and act as an advocate for that community. Seven Board members are elected in the following areas:

Wanganui District Council also appoints two Councillors to the Board to increase the cohesion between the two bodies. The young people of Wanganui are also represented through the appointment of two members of Wanganui District Council's Youth Committee.

- Attend relevant 'know how' courses through LGNZ.
- Strengthen ties with other Community Boards within Zone 3
- Consider projects for 2015 Best Practice awards



#### Matters arising not elsewhere on the Agenda: Progress reports

#### 1. Alex Wong corner

Although raised with the New Zealand Transport Agency, there has been no movement on proposed fee of \$375 per month (\$4,500 per year) plus GST for Council to have a licence to occupy on a month to month basis.

#### 2. Improved drainage at Gumboot throwing lane

The Council's Utilities Asset Manager considers the proposal from Keith Rowland a viable approach. However, the constant ponding in this area may be caused by a damage water pipe so this is being investigated first.

#### 3. Disposal of surplus buildings on the former Taihape College site, Rauma Road

There is no change from the situation reported to the Board's April meeting, i.e. Council has not yet received the anticipated licence to occupy covering the buildings which the Ministry of Education has agreed will remain on the site and be available for community use. The lack of this licence means the Ministry may negotiate directly with anyone wishing to use the buildings, thus qualifying Council's agreement that the Board be involved in deciding the use and occupancy of these buildings.

#### 4. Fence line with KiwiRail from Kiwi Road Bridge to Eagle Street

Council's Roading Operations Manager is arranging for a replacement fence to be erected.

#### 5. Main Street footpath surface

On Friday 23 October Opus undertook slip testing on the two sections of footpath Andrew Morriss treated with:

- Applying a concrete setting retardant over 3-4 hours followed by a light waterblast
- Waterblasting to around 3000psi only

Together with two other sections of footpath which had not been treated as above but previously had an anti-slip/protective coating applied.

The results conclusively showed that waterblasting to approximately 3000psi showed the greatest slip resistance. It is intended to provide this treatment to all smooth concrete footpaths in the Taihape CBD.

#### 6. Access off Toroa Road to Taihape Kindergarten

This upgrade was approved during the Long Term Plan process. As noted in the infrastructure update, this work is scheduled for completion by 31 January 2016.

#### 7. Sycamore trees at Taihape Memorial Park

These are to be felled, and left to rot. It is not intended to allow people come onto the Park and cut them for firewood – primarily for safety reasons.

#### 8. Water source for irrigation at Taihape Memorial Park

Council has now a clear understanding of how it will provide the necessary supply, through storage tanks. Tenders will be called for this work once it is clear that the Users Group is securing external funding for the irrigation system. That seems unlikely before February 2016.

#### 9. Banner over Hautapu Street

The further reconsideration and assessment by an engineer requested by the Board has not progressed. It is being given priority now.

#### 10. Taihape Pool

As noted in the infrastructure update, the learners' pools have been closed off because of a potential structural weakness in that area of the building. A structural assessment has now been completed and the identified remedial work is now being costed. It should not be necessary to close the pool while the repairs are being carried out.

#### 11. Water mains investigation for Dixon Way and Mangaone Valley Road

Consultation with affected property owners is expected to be arranged soon.

#### 12. Access to land on Manu Road corner

Ownership of this area is unclear. From Council's records, it seems that legalisation following the realignment of SH-1 remains incomplete.

#### 13. Profile for the Board on Council's website

This will be done before the end of the year.
