The Chair advised that item 8 of the Agenda (What's new, What's changed...?' – Consultation document for the 2016/17 Annual Plan") would be taken next, followed by item 10 (Taihape Memorial Park – future development)

4 Members' conflict of interest

Members were reminded of their obligation to declare any conflicts of interest that they may have in respect of the items on this agenda.

What's new, What's changed...?' – Consultation document for the 2016/17 Annual Plan

His Worship the Mayor gave a presentation on the key issues and choices in Rangitikei District Council's 2016/17 Annual Plan.

Items discussed included funding for youth services, long term management of Rangitikei's roading, water, wastewater and stormwater services and the proposal to construct a new amenity block on Taihape Memorial Park.

His Worship the Mayor then proceeded to outline the submission process, encouraging all those present to submit on any matter that they wanted Council to consider as it plans for the year ahead. If further information was required he suggested they contact their local Councillor.

10 Taihape Memorial Park – future development

Mr Shore spoke to and answered questions about his report.

One of the key issues was the proposal to build a new amenity block on Taihape Memorial Park which is now out for consultation as part of the draft 2016/2017 Annual Plan.

The large contingent from the Taihape Memorial Park Users Group that were present supported the proposal and were keen to have the location of the new amenity block settled.

Following a discussion on the proposed in ground irrigation system, there was some concern that the one metre spread of the pop ups may not be suitable for horses. Mr Shore felt that this issue should be addressed at the Taihape Memorial Park User Group meeting; however, he felt that with some tweaking and advice from the Irrigation specialist it would work.

There was further discussion on funding the irrigation system. Ms Mortland advised that the Taihape Community Development Trust had received \$5,000.00 from the Whanganui Community Foundation but that their application to Powerco Wanganui Trust Fund had been declined.

There was some suggestion that the Taihape Memorial Park User Group reapply to Powerco as well as considering other funding options.

Mr Thomas suggested that in future groups consult with a Powerco Wanganui Trustee prior to submitting their application. The application needed to be kept simple and it was important that it was submitted in time.

The Chair gave a verbal report, acknowledging the recent passing of three local residents. There was a brief discussion on the support that the community was receiving, noting that Mike King had offered to speak with the Taihape Area school students.

The Chair expressed her disappointment with the lack of communication between Council staff and the affected property owners following the recent slip on Eagle Street.

Other matters raised included keeping the Taihape Memorial Park gates open daily from 9am to 5pm, options for a designated community garden, trimming of the plane trees in Wren Street and a timeline for the installation of the main street banner.

These included refurbishing the town maps outside the Town Hall and Outback toilets, extending and upgrading the yellow Gumboot walk around the CBD and upgrading the dog exercise area in Robin Street.

There was further discussion on organising an action group to undertake work in the Taihape Triangle area — cleaning the tiles, repainting, and a general garden tidy up. This Board initiative would be advertised on Facebook community notices. Mrs Fannin undertook to draft an advertisement and email to members for comment. The media would be invited to take a photo for the local paper.

Mr Hodder spoke briefly to this item. Since preparing the item for the Board's agenda, he had further conversation with the Remuneration Authority: payment of additional duties to Board members did include the Chair (but not the appointed Councillors).

1 Allocation

- 1.1 The 2015/16 Small Projects Grant Scheme for the Taihape Ward is \$5,115.
- 1.2 The allocation of the Small Projects Grant Scheme is for the period 1 July to 30 June each year. At its meeting on 29 February 2016, Council resolved to allow carry-forward from one financial year to the next of up to 100% of the annual allocation for any Committee's Small Projects Grant Fund, with the proviso that this be a specific resolution of the Committee.

2 Breakdown

- 2.1 For the 2015/16 year the following amounts have been used by the Committee:
 - \$500 The Army Depot Waharoa Sponsorship
 - \$1,000 Birds on Signs Grant
 - \$1,000--- Taihape Heritage 'Go Digital Taihape'

3 Commitments not yet paid

3.1 At its April 2016 meeting, the Board agreed to cover the cost of hiring the Town Hall for the Community Market on 26 April 2016. This amount has not yet been paid out of the allocation. Therefore, the remaining amount for the 2015/16 financial year does not take into account this cost.

4 Remaining Budget

4.1 This leaves a remaining budget for the 2015/16 financial year of \$2,615.

Overall, a safe short month still packed with games and activities to keep the local youth occupied.




Membership


Attendance now stands at 3,496 in total since opening on the 1st July 2014.





Taihape Community Board want's Council to look at options to get the heating back on.



1 Background

1.1 Council approved the proposed District Plan Change 2016 for public consultation at its meeting on 29 March 2016. Public submissions were open from 4 March to 4 April 2016, with further submissions open from 9 April to 22 April 2016.

2 Comment

- 2.1 A total of 22 original submissions and 4 further submissions were received. The summary of original submissions is attached as <u>Appendix 1.</u>
- 2.2 The most significant issues raised are heritage, natural hazards (Taihape West Slip zone, advice notes and flooding), commercial zoning and rural zone setbacks.
- 2.3 Pre-hearing meetings have been held with submitters where there is scope to resolve issues prior to the hearing. Highly productive discussions have been held with Heritage New Zealand, New Zealand Institute of Architects (NZIA) Western Branch, Federated Farmers, NZTA and Horizons. Discussions between staff and submitters have also been occurring in situations where submissions would be more appropriately addressed through the Annual Plan process. This work has reduced the number of submissions to 19.
- 2.4 It is anticipated that a number of the issues identified by submitters will be addressed prior to the hearing including:
 - Flooding with all relevant submitters.
 - Taihape West Slip zone with Horizons Regional Council.
 - Advice notes for natural hazards with the majority of parties.
 - Liquefaction, ground shaking, active fault and landslide with all relevant submitters.
 - Signage with NZTA.
 - Manufacturing setbacks with Robert Snijders.
 - Heritage matters with NZIA Western Branch and Heritage New Zealand.
 - Issues raised by Federated Farmers.

- 2.5 The result from these pre-hearing discussions is that the issues to be considered at the hearing are likely to be reduced to the following matters:
 - Issues which are considered by staff to be outside of the scope of the current plan change process.
 - Taihape West Slip zone concerns from residents.
 - Minor issues related to heritage from other submitters.
- 2.6 The hearing has been tentatively scheduled for the last week of June 2016. This timing means that that officer reports are likely to be released early June. There are 14 submitters that have indicated they wish to speak to their submission, however, it is expected this number will reduce when issues are resolved.

3 Recommendation

3.1 That the memorandum 'Proposed District Plan Change – Update May 2016' be received.

Matters arising not elsewhere on the Agenda: Progress reports

1. Alex Wong corner

The Council's Park and Reserves team Leader has discussed the landscaping planting of the new garden areas with the New Zealand Transport Agency. As the gateway to the Taihape CBD, the planting of these areas is important to the Taihape community. There is an opportunity to select species based on plants that occur naturally in the Taihape area – particularly those which are unique to the area. Once the plant samples have arrived, a meeting with the Board will be arranged (within the next fortnight) to discuss the selection of species and confirm the planting theme.

Funding for this planting is being discussed with NZTA.

2. Walkway from Dixon Way to Taihape CBD

Despite discussion with Council staff, the New Zealand Transport Agency will not approve any work to make this route safer, even when the Council's Roading Operations Manager volunteered doing work at Council's expense. The Agency's view is that pedestrians walk along the state highways at their own risk and, in this case, there is no viable upgrade.

To gain more meaningful engagement from NZTA on this issue, Ministerial direction is needed. Securing that will require a request from the Council, conveyed by the Mayor. The Board may wish to recommend that Council consider doing this.

3. Community use of surplus buildings on the former Taihape College site, Rauma Road

At its meeting on 26 May 2016, Council will consider the feasibility of entering into the draft licence from the Ministry of Education to occupy the site of the former Taihape College, having regard for the likely costs in doing so. The outcome of that discussion will be reported to the meeting.

4. Fence line with KiwiRail from Kiwi Road Bridge to Eagle Street

The Board noted at its last meeting that the fence had not been replaced. The Roading Operations Manager understands the Board's concern but it is not a priority project in terms of current budget commitments: he will consider how and when the work is to be done.

5. Main Street footpath surface

A tender has been issued (closing 26 may 2016) for water pressure blasting of footpath areas in the town centres of Taihape, Hunterville, Marton and Bulls. Assuming a contract is entered into (i.e. that there is at least one compliant tender), the first clean would be late June or early July. i

6. Water source for irrigation at Taihape Memorial Park

The Taihape Memorial Park User Group, through the Taihape Community Development Trust, submitted applications for funding to the Whanganui Community Foundation and the Powerco Wanganui Trust – the latter being the major funder and who declined. The User

Group has refined its specification, paying close attention to the needs of horse events on the Park. A final specification is nearly ready.

Council is finalising a few details on the specification for the pumps needed and will go out to tender early June 2016.

7. Banner over Hautapu Street

A sketch of the proposed design is attached. Work is expected to be done in July.

8. Te Moehau Junction sign

The sign is ready. A bench is to be cut within the next week to improve the sight distance of the corner and to give a platform for the sign to be erected .

9. Walkway from Dixon Way to the CBD

There have been discussions with NZTA about this. While no formal response has yet been received by Council, it seems doubtful that NZTA will support making a formed footpath. .
