1 Background

1.1 Council's Youth Policy (adopted in 2012), has the aim:

"To create a family-friendly District which is a great place to raise a family, where children and young people are valued for their contribution to the community and are given an experience of childhood and adolescence that they will want for their own children in due course".

1.2 Council has approved \$60,000 for youth development in 2017/18. This money is being spent on the employment of two part-time youth co-ordinators, one for the southern area, and one for the north. Since the resignation of the Northern Youth Co-ordinator, the position is currently being filled 6 hours per week on an interim basis.

1.3 The outcomes that Council is seeking are:

- Regular engagement with young people in the District
- Implementation of a youth-led programme of activities, including holiday programmes and a Youth Forum
- A pool of trained volunteers to support and/or lead youth activities
- Fundraising and sponsorship secured to enable the activities to take place
- Activities during Youth Week and administration of the Rangitikei Youth Awards Scheme

2 Youth development programme

2.1 For the both the northern and southern areas, a work programme has been developed for Term 3 ([Appendix 1](#)). Progress will be reported monthly to the Committee.

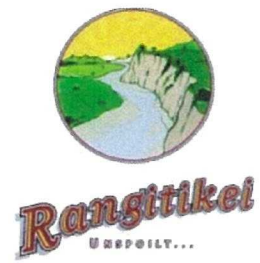

1 Allocation

- 1.1 The amount of the 2017-2018 Small Projects Grant Scheme for Taihape Ward is: \$5,379.00.
- 1.2 The allocation of the Small Projects Grant Scheme is for the period 1 July to 30 June each year. At its meeting on 29 February 2016, Council resolved to allow carry-forward from one financial year to the next of up to 100% of the annual allocation for any Committee's/Board's Small Projects Grant Fund, with the proviso that this be a specific resolution of the Committee/Board.

Description of issue to be tabled:

The volume of traffic on SH1 continues to increase and at certain times- holiday periods, the occurrence of special events and the peak tourist season, the availability of parking within the town centre can become limited. 1 Background

- 1.1 This report outlines the results of public consultation on the proposed changing of the name of 'Inland Road' to 'Keith Law Road'.
- 1.2 This request came from Jonathan Heaphy, son-in-law of Keith Law, who recently passed away. Keith Law was Chairman of the Board of Directors and a shareholder of Te Rangi Pai Forest Ltd.
- 1.3 While this was not subject to special consultative procedure, consultation with the community was still viewed as necessary. Written submissions were requested between 24 August and 22 September 2017.
- 1.4 Letters were sent to land owners whose properties were in close proximity to Inland Road and they were provided with the background information as to Mr Heaphy's request and informed how to make a submission.
- 1.5 If the name were to be changed, advice of this would be sent to property owners on the road, Land Information New Zealand and New Zealand Post. Replacement road signage would be installed.

2 Submissions

- 2.1 There were six submissions in total, with four of these opposed to the change, one was in support and one was neutral. These submissions are attached in [Appendix 1](#).
- 2.2 Key themes from the submitters opposed to the name change were:
 - Mr Heaphy, who has made the request is not a local as he resides in Hawkes Bay
 - While Keith Law was a respected member of the community, there are others who have also made contributions to the road/community
 - It is not appropriate for a personal name to be given to the road

- The name of the road has historical significance – inland route to the Mokai Valley prior to the construction of the Mokai Bridge

- 2.3 The submitter who supported the name change made no specific comments.
- 2.4 The submitter who was neutral to the name change (Department of Conservation) noted that had no concerns regarding the proposed name change.
- 2.5 Overall, the majority of submissions were opposed to the proposed name change, and favoured keeping the status quo.

Matters arising not elsewhere on the Agenda: Progress reports

1. Taihape Pool upgrade

Work proceeds with the upgrade to filtration and heating (Contract 1057). It is expected to be completed before the scheduled reopening of the Pool for the 2017/18 season.

Council has yet to make a decision on the management of the Taihape Swim Centre until 2019.

2. Taihape Showjumping Group

The Group has made an application (under the Council's Parks Upgrade Programme) for funding support to build new, enlarged horse yards. This application will be considered by the Assets/Infrastructure Committee at its meeting on 12 October 2017.

3. Mangaweka Village toilets

An alternative site near the town museum is currently being checked for resource consent issues. Having it alongside the Mangaweka Hall is less desirable than initially seemed: to the north it would be very close to an existing residential property; to the south, soil compacting and a retaining wall would be needed.

4. Mangaweka campground toilets

Last meeting's update noted that with the location of the new Mangaweka bridge unknown, Council is purchasing a relocatable ablution block from Cube Innovations. It should be on site before the end of October 2017.
