10 National Election results

Local Government New Zealand said there has been an increase in the number of young people and women elected to office.

A quarter of the country's mayors are now women, up from 19 percent in 2016 and there are five mayors who are under 40.

Sophie Handford, 18, is believed to be the country's youngest new councillor. She has been elected to Kāpiti Coast District Council and said political inaction over climate change compelled her to join the race.

22-year-old Tamatha Paul is now a Wellington city councillor, she said the more young people saw their peers on councils, the more inspired they would be to get involved.

Fisher Wang, 19, who has just been elected to Rotorua Lakes Council, said he was determined to make a difference and would not let other councillors intimidate him.

Local Government New Zealand president Dave Cull has said that having more young people and women meant councils would make better decisions.

Regional collaboration on climate change

On 3 September 2019, all councils in the Horizons region signed a Memorandum of Understanding 'Working together to adapt to climate change'. This is attached as Appendix 1.

As noted in the document, all the councils are signatories to the Local Government Declaration on Climate Change. It is intended to include the contents of the MoU in the next triennial agreement, negotiated after the October elections.

One aspect which will warrant consideration in the regional collaboration is the recently released Arotakenga Huringa Ahuarangi – A framework for the National Climate Change Risk Assessment (NCCRA) for Aotearoa New Zealand:

This is the first step in the development of the NCCRA, which is a requirement of the Climate Change Response (Zero Carbon) Amendment Bill currently before Parliament. The NCCRA will enable a broad range of risks to be compared according to their nature, severity and urgency, which the Government will use to prioritise action to reduce risks or take advantage of opportunities through a National Adaptation Plan.

The NCCRA is expected to be complete by mid-2020. Future risk assessments will be undertaken by the Climate Change Commission.

Action for healthy waterways

On 5 September 2019, the Government released a discussion document 'Actions for healthy waterways'. Proposals include new National Environmental Standards for Freshwater and Wastewater.

The closing date for submissions has been extended from 17 October to 31 October 2019. His Worship the Mayor is attending the Local Government New Zealand Freshwater Forum on 24 September 2019. That will influence how Council responds to the discussion document.

Memorandum of Understanding between Council, Ngā Wairiki Ngāti Apa and Marton Development Group

This Memorandum of Understanding is being drafted to formalise the purpose and relationship of incorporating the cultural presence and narratives of Ngā Wairiki Ngāti Apa into the Marton Memorial Hall Playground and Tutaeporoporo Trail.

This agreement will cover the following main points:

- outcomes,
- consideration of iwi tikanga and intellectual property rights,
- the responsibility and roles of each party,
- the purpose of the working party made up of iwi experts and designers)

Vulnerable landfills

Tonkin & Taylor has been engaged to develop a nationally applicable screening tool to identify landfills that may be vulnerable to natural hazards associated with climate change. All territorial authorities and regional councils are asked to participate in an online survey to show what type of data is held. It is due for completion by 1 November 2019.
